### Celebrating 50 years of Excellence at Hill Park - from January 2006

Dorothy Joliffe, who retired from teaching as head of the Geography department at Hill Park was the guest speaker.

Hill Park was built on land donated by Sackville Hill in 1950 to the city park board. In May of 1953 Ernie Hutton was named as the principal of the first secondary school on the mountain. He chose the VPs for the school, along with department heads and staff and invited them to join him at "Heaven on the Hill". Many innovations in education were introduced at Hill formation of a girls soccer team and the Park including packaged options - an idea of Dr Gordon Price. Students would take 5 compulsory subjects and choose 3 options. This system would allow them to delay choosing their stream until the end of grade 10. Within three years the student population had reached 2000 and shifts were introduced. Mr. Hutton was principal from 1955-1960: his word was law; students walked in lines; Wednesday was assembly day. He and Glenn Mallory wrote the school song and HP excelled at sports. HP boasted the fist sea cadet corps at a high school: the first to include girls and the largest in Canada. He also introduced student trips to Stratford.

Mr. Moles followed and started the annual toy drive while Bob Croft led the basketball team to victory. Luke Leroy followed in 1966 and had a mural painted in the cafeteria for Centennial vear. The annual musicals continued and students began to return to HP as staff members. Steve Oneschuck was next, followed by Bill Mastin.

In 1973 the recreation centre opened. The 80's saw the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the school, the beginning of the girls field hockey dynasty. In 1984 grade 13 returned to the school as enrolment dropped and adults began taking day classes.

The 90's principals included Beth Jazvac, Joan Morse, Gail Rappolt, John Smees and Jon Sims. Dorothy finished her talk saying that the history and changes, which Hill Park had seen, were reflections of the changes on the Mountain. The evening concluded with a rousing rendition of the school song.

This year Hill Park Secondary School is celebrating 55 years of Excellence congratulations!
