A Tale of Two Churches

On Sunday April 29th, Farewell Services were held in two Mountain churches, Chalmers Presbyterian 1905-2018 and Mount Hamilton Christian Reformed 1952-2018.

Chalmers Presbyterian Church has been a fixture on the Mountain for 113 years. The Farewell Service sermon titled "Hearts Untroubled" was preached by Rev. Dr. Victoria Eldridge. After the service refreshments were served and visitors reminisced in McLean Hall.

Presbyterian families of the Mountain began meeting in 1903 as the "Incline Mission" in the Mission School on Concession Street. By 1905 they had raised sufficient funds to build and open Chalmers Presbyterian Church on the north side of Concession Street opposite East 23rd Street. The new church was described by the Hamilton Spectator as "a handsome little brick church… neat and natty, which is added to by very handsome electric light chandeliers."

After only 17 years, the congregation had grown so large that a new church building was opened in 1922 on land at the corner of Mountain Park and Cliff Avenues. The Spectator reported that "the new church is modern in every way and adds considerably to the beauty of the mountain brow." In 1968 the current sanctuary was opened, the building featuring a large illuminated cross designed to be visible from the lower city. The 1922 building was converted for use as a church hall.

The congregation will be merging with Trinity Presbyterian Church (formerly Eastmount). The closed church has been sold to a development corporation.

A Tale of Two Churches (cont'd)

The Farewell Service at Mount Hamilton Christian Reformed Church entitled "Looking Back; Moving Forward" was conducted by Pastor Roelof Peereboom. The congregation of mostly Dutch speaking immigrants began meeting in 1952 at the Barton Community Hall on Upper James St. before moving in 1955 to a brand new church building at 1411 Upper Wellington St. The church survived a fire in 1976 and a large addition was opened in 1988 along with the adjacent Wellingstone Christian Home.

The building on Upper Wellington will eventually be demolished and replaced with a Christian long-term

care and assisted living facility.


The congregation has purchased and renovated the former Mount Hope United Church which was built in 1876 and closed in 2018. They now worship under the name Mount Hope Community Christian Reformed Church and an Open House and Dedication service was held September 23rd.

Test your "Mountain Memories"


The first Chalmers Presbyterian Church pictured here was built in 1905. After only 16 years of use it was replaced with a larger building in 1921.
