DEFINING MOMENTS IN OUR HERITAGE

In the month of June we annually commemorate the Battle of Stoney Creek as part of a **Defining Moment in Canadian history** when **o**ur national identity was preserved and American republicanism was rejected. A good thing considering the current presidential nomination debates!

During the 1812 Bicentennial, fellow volunteers on the former Hamilton Historical Board (HHB) identified **two** other related defining moments or "Wow" factors in Hamilton's history that have been overshadowed by the Battle of Stoney Creek. They happened at the foot of Hamilton Mountain and on Lake Ontario.

Realizing that most Canadians have no accurate perception of what was the key to the successful defence of Canada, HHB volunteers chose two additional themes for heritage plaques: Brock's early British success which gave Canadians confidence to resist invasion; and the control of transportation and communication on the Great Lakes so vital to military success.

The "Brock Walk" program provided an opportunity to plaque Major General Brock's route to his spectacular victory at Fort Detroit in August 1812. Enroute to Lake Erie he collected regiments, militiamen and Indians. At the future site of Hamilton, he recruited 250 U.E.L. militiamen including several regional leading personalities (Hamilton, Hatt, Land, Durand). The plaque was unveiled at a 100seat Loyalist dinner and <u>installed at Brock's former camp</u> <u>site at the foot of the Jolley Cut</u>. Following the "Brock Walk" theme the plaque is entitled "Brock Stepped Here" and for a "Wow" factor states that the surrender of Fort Detroit and the Michigan territory was the largest territorial loss in U.S. history.

The HHB's plaquing subcommittee approved another bicentennial plaque based on my research about a naval battle known as the **Burlington Races.** It was a daring military clash at the head of Lake Ontario using superb seamanship to determine the outcome of the war and the future of Canada. Truly a "Wow" factor !

On September 28, 2013, the bicentenary of this naval victory, my corrected version of the battle entitled, "From Fancy To Fact" was unveiled. The event took place beside the walking trail observation deck at the <u>Lakeview Banquet</u> <u>Centre</u> overlooking the Burlington shoreline with yours truly in 1812 naval costume. Despite the beautiful weather, no invited guests showed up. But suddenly a wedding party and their banquet guests appeared. We became part of their celebration with 200 people attending the unveiling. An auspicious beginning predicting that this plaque will give Canadians a better appreciation of our naval history.
